ORDINANCE NO. 60

ORDINANCE RELATING TO ADMISSIONS AND EXAMINATIONS FOR  
THREE-YEAR DEGREE COURSE (SEMESTER SYSTEM) FOR  
THE DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF LAW (LL.B.)  
IN THE FACULTY OF LAW

1. The first degree in the faculty of Law shall be designated as "Bachelor of Law" And shall be abbreviated as "LL.B."
2. This ordinance is based on the recommendations of the Bar Council of India. The provisions of the ordinance are subject to change as per directives of the Bar Council of India and the instructions issued by the Department of Higher Education, Govt. of Madhya Pradesh from time to time and as and when adopted and notified by the University.
3. DURATION OF COURSE AND TIME DISTRIBUTION:
  - (i) The LL.B. Course shall be of SIX SEMESTERS spread over THREE YEARS. Each semester shall be of six months duration including the period of examination and semester break of about three weeks.
  - (ii) A student for LL.B. shall be required to pass Six Semester Examinations. The Semester Examinations will be normally held in the months of November-December and May-June each year.
4. ADMISSIONS:
  - (i) A candidate seeking admission for the LL.B. Course must have at least passed graduate examination from this University or from any other recognized University and must have secured minimum percent of marks specified under the admission rules notified by the Department of Higher Education, Government of Madhya Pradesh from time to time.
  - (ii) A student will have to seek admission afresh in 1st, 2nd, and 3rd Years of LL.B. Course.
  - (iii) A student who has passed LL.B. 1st Year or 2nd Year Examination from any other recognized University having either Semester pattern or Annual Examination pattern of Three year degree course in Law will be admitted respectively to III Semester (2nd Year) or V Semester (3rd Year) of LL.B. Course only if he has passed both I and II Semester (1st Year) or both III and IV Semester (2nd Year) Examinations from the University concerned.  
 Provided that the Course in Law is of equivalent standard and of almost identical syllabus as for the respective examination of this University.

Provided further: that a student shall be required to pass in those papers of the previous semester examinations of this University, which he has not passed earlier in the other University because those papers did not form the part of curriculum in that University in the earlier examinations.

(iv) The admission fees and tuition fees to be paid by a student to the college each year shall be as prescribed by the college.

#### 5. ATTENDANCE:

(i) A student shall be required to put in a minimum attendance of 75% both in lectures and internal assessment separately in each semester for appearing in that semester examination.

Provided that in the exceptional cases, the Kulpati may condone the attendance as required above up to 60%.

(ii) A student who has completed a regular course of study of Law in a constituent or an affiliated college of this University for a semester with the minimum attendance as mentioned above shall be eligible for appearing in that semester examination.

#### 6. CURRICULUM:

The syllabus for each semester shall be as prescribed by the Faculty of Law on the recommendation of the Board of Studies in Law of the University.

#### 7. RULES FOR PASSING EXAMINATION

##### A. Internal Assessment:

There will be one internal assessment each year as prescribed in the scheme of examination. A student shall have to pass in this internal assessment, i.e. secure 36% marks in each internal assessment, to become eligible to appear in II or IV or VI semester examinations. Each internal assessment shall be equivalent to a paper.

If a student does not pass in internal assessment, then his examination form shall not be forwarded by the Principal and he shall not be issued admission card for full examination. Such a student will have to pass in internal assessment next year as an ex-student. He will become eligible to appear in the full examination only after passing in internal assessment.

##### B. University Examination:

##### I. Minimum pass marks in papers:

Each paper shall be of 100 marks and of 3 hours duration. The minimum marks required to pass in any paper are 36%.

## II. First Year Examinations:

1. A student who appears in I Semester Examination will be eligible for admission to II Semester Course irrespective of whether he passes in any paper or not, i.e., whether he secures 36% marks in any paper or not, in I Semester Examination.
2. At the end of 1st year, there will be a full examination, i.e., of all the papers of I and II Semesters.
3. A student has to appear in the full examination of 1st Year in all the papers of II Semester and he can also appear in any paper/papers of I Semester. In the papers of I Semester in which he does not appear in this full examination, his previous marks will be carried forward. In the papers of I Semester in which he opts to appear again in this full examination, his previous marks shall not be carried forward in any situation whatsoever.
4. After the full examination of 1st Year, a student shall be declared as 'Pass' in I and II Semester (1st Year) Examinations if he secures 36% marks in each paper and 48% marks in aggregate of I and II Semester (1st Year) Examinations. He will become eligible for admission to III Semester (2nd Year) Course.
5. After the full examination of 1st Year, a student shall be declared as 'ATKT' in I and II Semester (1st Year) Examinations:
  - a. if he secures 48% marks in aggregate, but does not secure 36% marks in a maximum of two papers of I and II Semester (1st Year) Examinations. He will become eligible for admission to III Semester (2nd Year) Course with this backlog of one or two papers. A student can appear in backlog papers in the next available identical semester or full examination. A backlog of more than two papers is not allowed for admission to III Semester (2nd Year) Course, or,
  - b. if he secures 36% marks in all the papers of I and II Semester (1st Year) Examinations, but does not secure 48% marks in aggregate of I and II Semester (1st Year) Examinations. He will become eligible for admission to III Semester (2nd Year) Course with a backlog of one or two papers of his choice. Such a student can appear in this backlog of one or two papers of his choice at the next available identical semester or full examination so that he gets an opportunity to secure 48% marks in aggregate of I and II Semester (1st Year) Examinations. If such a student does not avail of this opportunity or does not secure 48% marks in aggregate in 1st Year Examination, then his result will be declared as 'Fail', and he will become an ex-student of that college.
6. After the full examination of 1st Year, a student shall be declared as 'Fail' in I and II Semester (1st Year) Examinations:
  - a. if he does not secure 48% marks in aggregate of I and II Semester (1st Year) Examinations and does not secure 36% marks in one or more papers, or,
  - b. if he does not secure 36% marks in more than two papers of I and II Semester (1st Year) Examinations.

- A 'Fail' student will become an ex-student of that college.
7. An ex-student can appear in I and II Semester Examinations when they are held next year. Such a student shall have to appear again in all the papers of I and II semester examinations. Only his marks of internal assessment from his previous attempt in II semester examination will be carried forward.

### III. Second Year Examinations:

1. A student who appears in III Semester examination will be eligible for admission to IV Semester Course irrespective of whether he passes in any paper or not, i.e., whether he secures 36% marks in any paper or not, in III Semester Examination.
2. At the end of 2nd year, there will be a full examination, i.e., of all the papers of III and IV Semesters.
3. A student has to appear in the full examination of 2nd Year in all the papers of IV Semester and he can also appear in any paper/papers of III Semester. In the papers of III Semester in which he does not appear in this full examination, his previous marks will be carried forward. In the papers of III Semester in which he opts to appear again in this full examination, his previous marks shall not be carried forward in any situation whatsoever.
4. Passing 1st Year examination while studying in 2nd Year Course:  
A student, who has a backlog of one or two papers of I and II Semester (1st Year) Examinations and who appears in the available identical semester or full examination while studying in 2nd Year Course, shall be declared as 'Pass' in the I and II Semester (1st Year) Examinations if he secures 36% marks in backlog papers and also secures 48% marks in aggregate of I and II Semester (1st Year) Examinations.
5. After the full examination of 2nd Year a student shall be declared as 'Pass' in III and IV Semesters (2nd Year) Examinations if he secures 36% marks in each paper and 48% marks in aggregate of III and IV Semester (2nd Year) examinations. He will become eligible for admission to V semester (3rd Year) course provided that he has also been declared as 'Pass' in the 1st Year Examinations.
6. A student who is declared as 'Pass' in 2nd Year Examinations, but has not been declared as 'Pass' in 1st Year Examinations, shall not be eligible for admission to V Semester Course. Such a student will have to appear in the backlog papers of I and II Semester (1st Year) Examinations at the next available identical semester or full examination as an ex-student. He will become eligible for admission to V Semester Course when he is declared as 'Pass' in 1st Year Examinations.
7. After the full examination of 2nd Year, a student shall be declared as 'ATKT' in III and IV Semester (2nd Year) Examinations:
  - a. if he secures 48% marks in aggregate, but does not secure 36% marks in a maximum of two papers of III and IV Semester (2nd Year) Examinations. He will become eligible for admission to V Semester (3rd Year) Course with this backlog of one or two papers. A student can appear in backlog papers in the

- next available identical semester or full examination. A backlog of more than two papers is not allowed for admission to V Semester (3rd Year) Course, or,
- b. if he secures 36% marks in all the papers of III and IV Semester (2nd Year) Examinations, but does not secure 48% marks in aggregate of III and IV Semester (2nd Year) Examinations. He will become eligible for admission to V Semester (3rd Year) Course with a backlog of one or two papers of his choice. Such a student can appear in this backlog of one or two papers of his choice at the next available identical semester or full examination so that he gets an opportunity to secure 48% marks in aggregate of III and IV Semester (2nd Year) Examinations. If such a student does not avail of this opportunity or does not secure 48% marks in aggregate in 2nd Year Examination, his result will be declared as 'Fail', and he will become an ex-student of that college.

Provided that a student shall be declared as 'ATKT' only after he has been declared as 'Pass' in 1st Year Examination. If the result of such a student has not been declared for 1st Year Examination, then his result of 2nd Year Examination will be withheld ('W.H.') till such time.

8. After the full examination of 2nd Year, a student shall be declared as 'Fail' in III and IV Semester (2nd Year) Examinations:
- a. if he does not secure 48% marks in aggregate of III and IV Semester (2nd Year) Examinations and does not secure 36% marks in one or more papers, or,
- b. if he does not secure 36% marks in more than two papers of III and IV Semester (2nd Year) Examinations.

A 'Fail' student will become an ex-student of that college.

9. An ex-student can appear in III and IV Semester Examinations when they are held next year. Such a student shall have to appear again in all the papers of III and IV Semester Examinations. Only his marks of internal assessment from his previous attempt in IV Semester Examination will be carried forward.

If an ex-student of 2nd Year had a backlog of two papers of 1st Year Examination and had passed only in one of them in the earlier attempt, then he will have to appear again in both the backlog papers irrespective of the fact that he did pass in one of them in the earlier attempt.

#### IV. Third Year Examinations:

1. A student who appears in V Semester Examination will be eligible for admission to VI Semester Course irrespective of whether he passes in any paper or not, i.e., whether he secures 36% marks in any paper or not, in V Semester Examination.
2. At the end of 3rd year, there will be a full examination, i.e., of all the papers of V and VI Semesters.
3. A student has to appear in the full examination of 3rd Year in all the papers of VI Semester and he can also appear in any paper/papers of V Semester. In the papers of V Semester in which he does not appear in this full examination, his previous marks will be carried forward. In the papers of V Semester in which he opts to

appear again in this full examination, his previous marks shall not be carried forward in any situation whatsoever.

4. *Passing 2nd Year examination while studying in 3rd Year Course:*

A student, who has a backlog of one or two papers of III and IV Semester (2nd Year) Examinations and who appears in the available identical semester or full examination while studying in 3rd Year Course, shall be declared as 'Pass' in the III and IV Semester (2nd Year) Examinations if he secures 36% marks in backlog papers and also secures 48% marks in aggregate of III and IV Semester (2nd Year) Examinations.

5. After the full examination of 3rd Year, a student shall be declared as 'Pass' in V and VI Semester (3rd Year) Examinations if he secures 36% marks in each paper and 48% marks in aggregate of V semester and VI Semester (3rd Year) Examinations. He will be declared to have passed the LL.B. Course provided that he has also been declared as 'Pass' in the 1st and 2nd Year Examinations.
6. A student who is declared as 'Pass' in 3rd Year Examinations, but has not been declared as 'Pass' in 2nd Year Examinations, shall not be declared to have passed the LL.B. Course. Such a student will have to appear in the backlog papers of III and IV Semester (2nd Year) Examinations at the next available identical semester or full examination as an ex-student. He will be declared to have passed in the LL.B. Course only when he is declared as 'Pass' in 2nd Year Examinations.
7. After the full examination of 3rd Year a student shall be declared as 'ATKT' in V and VI Semester (3rd Year) Examinations:
  - a. if he secures 48% marks in aggregate, but does not secure 36% marks in a maximum of two papers of V and VI semester (3rd Year) Examinations. Such a student can appear in backlog papers in the next available identical semester or full examination. A backlog of more than two papers is not allowed after 3rd Year full examination, or,
  - b. if he secures 36% marks in all the papers of V and VI Semester (3rd Year) Examinations, but does not secure 48% marks in aggregate of V and VI Semester (3rd Year) Examinations. Such a student can appear in this backlog of one or two papers of his choice at the next available identical semester or full examination so that he gets an opportunity to secure 48% marks in aggregate of V and VI Semester (3rd Year) Examinations. If such a student does not avail of this opportunity or does not secure 48% marks in aggregate in 3rd Year Examinations, then his result will be declared as 'Fail', and he will become an ex-student of that college.  
 Provided that a student shall be declared as 'ATKT' only after he has been declared as 'Pass' in 2nd Year Examination. If the result of such a student has not been declared for 2nd Year Examination, then his result of 3rd Year Examination will be withheld ('W.H.') till such time.
8. After the full examination of 3rd Year a student shall be declared as 'Fail' in V and VI Semester (3rd Year) Examinations:
  - a. if he does not secure 48% marks in aggregate of V and VI Semester (3rd Year) Examinations and does not secure 36% marks in one or more papers, or,
  - b. if he does not secure 36% marks in more than two papers of V and VI Semester (3rd Year) Examinations.

A 'Fail' student will become an ex-student of that college.

9. An ex-student can appear in V and VI Semester Examinations when they are held next year. Such a student shall have to appear again in all the papers of V and VI Semester Examinations. Only his marks of internal assessment from his previous attempt in VI Semester Examination will be carried forward.

If an ex-student of 3rd Year had a backlog of two papers of 2nd Year Examinations and had passed only in one of them in the earlier attempt, then he will have to appear again in both the backlog papers irrespective of the fact that he did pass in one of them in the earlier attempt.

#### 8. GENERAL RULES FOR UNIVERSITY EXAMINATION:

1. There will be no supplementary examination for any semester.
2. Examination fees, as prescribed by the University, shall have to be paid for each semester examination in which a student wants to appear. Even if a student appears in a single paper in a semester examination, he will have to pay the full fees for that semester examination. At the time of full examination, if a student wants to appear in both the semester examinations, then he will have to fill examination forms for both the semester examinations and will have to pay full fees for both the semester examinations separately.
3. Revaluation of the University examination answer books shall be done as per University rules.
4. After a student has passed in all the SIX SEMESTER Examinations, division shall be awarded on the basis of the total marks obtained by him in all the Six Semester Examinations as given below:
  - First division: 60% or above
  - Second division: 48% or more but less than 60%
5. Kulpati Grace marks as per rules may be awarded.
6. In each semester, 1 grace mark may be awarded if a student has secured 48% in aggregate and is short of 1 mark in the minimum passing marks for a paper.
7. The medium of examination shall be Hindi or English.
8. There will be no moderation of University examination papers.
9. A student has to be enrolled in the University as per University rules.
10. The examinations should be planned in such a way that the total period for any examination including the declaration of result is such that the next semester course starts in time.

#### 9. DISPUTES:

Any dispute arising out of this Ordinance or otherwise shall be decided by the Executive Council of the University, whose decision shall be final.

### Scheme of Examination

There shall be 25 University examination papers and three internal assessments, i.e., 28 papers in all, in the Three Year LL.B. Course spread over SIX semester examinations as per detailed examination scheme given below. Each paper shall be of 100 marks. Minimum passing marks in each paper are 36%. The rules for passing in a semester examination are given in the text of the Ordinance.

ORDINANCE No. 218

61-B

Ordinances for various Diploma Courses (2 years) in Paramedical subjects

The Objective of the courses -

1. The training of the candidate registering for various diploma (2 years) courses are aimed to carry out all routine diagnostic /therapeutic test on modern hospital laboratory
2. The Diploma course is of two years.
3. Eligibility for admission in all Paramedical Diploma Courses, except Perfusionist.
  - a) The candidate must have passed 10+2 with at least 40% marks in aggregate of Physics, Chemistry and Biology (PCB), and for DMLT, 10+2 (PCB) or 10+2 vocational (MLT) course with at least 40% marks will also be eligible.
  - b) For diploma in Perfusion Technology (Perfusionist, 2 years course, the candidate should have passed B. Sc (Biology group) with minimum 45% marks. The University will award P.G. Diploma in perfusion technology.
4. In case of SC/ST/OBC candidates, 5% marks relaxation will be given for the admission in the above said courses.
5. Weightage will be given as per university rules.
6. Number of seats will be 50 in each course.
7. The minimum age for admission shall be 17 years on 31 December of the Academic Year of admission.
8. The selection of candidate will be on the basis of the entrance examination or in the absence of entrance examination purely on merit list prepared on the basis of marks obtained in qualifying examination.
9. For diploma examination, candidates whose attendance is 75% theory classes & 85% practicals can only appear in the university examination. *Relaxation up to 5%*
10. Candidate failing in main and subsequently in supplementary examination shall not be allowed to attend higher class before clearing previous examination.
11. Re-valuation & Re-totalling both should be allowed as per University rules.
12. In order to pass the examination it is mandatory to obtain 50% marks in theory and practical examination separately, the viva and the sessional marks will be added to the theory marks.
13. Other rules regarding conduct of examination will be as per the ordinance No 6.
14. Permission will be given to start the courses after the permission from M.P. Paramedical Council (Department of Medical Education, Government of M.P.)

may be given

15. Syllabus and scheme of the examination shall be decided by the Board of Studies and Academic Council of the University from time to time as per guidelines from M.P. Paramedical Council.
16. The medium of examination shall be English
17. The colleges must conduct sessional exams twice in an academic year (once in a six months period) and send the same marks to the university one week before the commencement of University theory examination.
18. In order to be an examiner: a faculty member should have minimum three years teaching experience and not below the rank of the Asstt. Professor and /or Demonstrator/ Tutor.
19. The examination papers (Theory) will be evaluated centrally at Barkatullah University, Bhopal.
20. The examiner who evaluates the theory copy, preferably be appointed as external for Practical Examinations for the said course.
21. Diploma students will be eligible for supplementary examination.
22. The Postgraduate Diploma courses being conducted at present in Gandhi Medical College, Bhopal should also be added to the list of course conducting by M.P. Paramedical Council, however the examination to the above said courses (theory & practical) will be conducted by the Barkatullah University, Bhopal after approval of the ordinance.
